FARNHAM RECORD
The death of Pfc. Nordblum brings the total number of Farnham boys who died in service to seven, which is something of a record for a community of 400 people.
These are listed as Lieut. Raymond Koch, airforce; Radio Operator Ed. Steuhring, merchant marine; Pvt. Sam. Battaglia in the infantry; Pfc. Ed. Schraeder who was killed in France, mechanized cavalry; Pfc. Howard Nordblum; Corp. Michael Graci who was killed Oct. 25, 1944 in Leyte; and Pfc. Daniel Kibber who died while in service.
